Message from the Program Manager

Hopefully everyone is back to work in the New Year after a restful winter break! This quarter the International Affairs Program (IAP) Office focused on working with monitors and Foreign Area Officers (FAO) to get slating done for summer 2023 movers, fought for program funds at the Program Objective Memorandum (POM) cycle, and took initial steps to becoming a Single-Track

MOS. Despite our best efforts to get all of our FAO billets filled, we were only able to get about 60% of the vacancies filled. Some of this is based on monitors not allowing second tour and Experience Track FAOs to leave their PMOS and some is based on FAO production vs. billet vacancy mismatches. Either way, the end state is the same...gaps in the Fleet Marine Force and supporting establishment that could be filled with IAP Marines. The POM brief went well but I expect that we will lose some funds as the service looks to realign resources in support of Force Design. In the meantime, we are planning as though we will get all of our program funds and are accepting applications for LREC sustainment training. We recognize that it is difficult to maintain some languages while you are serving in your PMOS, so as always, we will prioritize LREC sustainment funding for those who have orders to a FAO billet in 2023. Our initial steps to becoming a Single-Track MOS have been difficult but purposeful. The bottom line is that we are making progress, but the road is long. We remain hopeful that there is value to the service in our proposition, but it is a big undertaking and there are numerous stake holders who need to be convinced. We will continue to advocate for International Affairs Programs regardless of the outcome and welcome your support in any way you can assist. In the meantime, continue to support your respective commands, whether you are on an IAP billet or not, and use your Pol-Mil skills to showcase the value IAP Marines provide to Force Design and emerging concepts such as Stand-In Forces.

Personnel Exchange Program Spotlight

Whether it be Force Design 2030, A Concept for Stand-In Forces, Advantage at Sea or any number of other guiding documents, the Naval Service places a premium on relationships with allies and partners. In order to prevail across the competition continuum, Advantage at Sea emphasizes one of its five themes as "strengthen our alliances and partnerships." Personnel Exchange Program (PEP) Marines contribute to strengthening partnerships by embedding with the Host Nation (HN) as permanent personnel. Being embedded helps to enhance interoperability, facilitate theater security cooperation efforts, build partnership capacity, advance relationships, and exchange skills. Because the program is reciprocal, partners and allies alike reap the same benefits of having their own PEPs embedded with USMC units. USMC PEPs receive valuable exposure to the HN military, geo-political landscape, culture, language, and civil society. They also have the added benefit of access to the U.S. Country Teams where they are located. Frequent interactions with respective Security Cooperation Offices, Defense Attaché Offices, Department of State and other interagency partners add broad and deep experience that, when taken back to the Fleet Marine Force, improves the Marine Corps' ability to interface not just with allies and partners at the tactical level, but country teams and the interagency. Perhaps one unintended consequence of the PEP is the graduate-level education one receives in U.S. foreign policy and how the USG interfaces with its counterparts on the world stage. As we look to concepts like expeditionary advanced base operations, littoral operations in a

contested environment, and Stand-In Forces, Marines with this real-world knowledge of both partner nation (PN) internal workings and USG country team complexities may prove invaluable to the MAGTF in effectively traversing the operating environment.

The USMC-Peruvian Marine Corps (PERMAR) relationship has been around a long time. In 1964, PERMAR sent enlisted Marines to the U.S. to receive training and instruction from Marine Corps Drill Instructors to improve PERMAR TTP of their own entry-level training. In the years since, the relationship has continued to expand and strengthen. In recent years, Peru has enhanced its ability to conduct amphibious operations. In 2018, construction was completed on the amphibious ship, BAP Pisco (AMP-156). An LPD, the Pisco has responded to numerous domestic calls for disaster relief as well as participating in multinational exercises. 2023 promises to see continued development of Peru's amphibious capacity with the completion of the Pisco's sister ship, the BAP Paita.

It is this shared focus on amphibious operations that drives current USMC-PERMAR operations, activities, and investments. In the last year, bilateral Subject Matter Expert (SME) Exchanges were conducted on priorities ranging from Amphibious doctrine to Helicopter Rope Suspension Techniques (HRST), to Amphibious logistics. USMC teams travelled to Peru, partnering with their PERMAR counterparts to conduct in-person exchanges that help both sides to get after interoperability and a shared understanding for how we will operate together, if called upon to do so. Other

engagements like the Marine Leaders of the Americas Conference, Staff Planners Working Group, Maritime Staff Talks, Pacific Amphibious Leaders Symposium, MARFSOUTH-PERMAR key leader engagements (KLE), and the PEPs daily interactions all continue to help strengthen the relationship.

In all these interactions and exchanges, it is the PEPs daily exposure to the PN and the PN's ability to leverage a PEPs MAGTF knowledge that provide perhaps the most "bang for the buck." Whether it be observing training evolutions, teaching classes, reviewing PN doctrine, aiding in the planning of bilateral or multinational exercises, or facilitating the MARFOR's access and influence to the PN, PEPs influence PN's in a way that is beneficial to all.

Interaction with key leaders helps ensure lasting ties that will undoubtedly bear fruit in the future. In the Marine Corps we love quantifiable metrics to measure performance or effectiveness. But sometimes, it is the non-measurable qualitative relationships that can do the most good. On a recent KLE between the MARFORSOUTH DCOM and PERMAR, BGen Kevin Collins was surprised to uncover an interesting fact; that he and the PERMAR Chief of Staff had been training together in the Peruvian desert some 25+ years ago - during UNITAS! Engagements like this strengthen and reinforce the small part we play in pursuing the nation's interests abroad. Over decades of touch points and engagements,

senior leaders on both sides of this important bilateral relationship were able to break bread and recall fond memories of time spent training.

IAP Marines Attend the Eurasian Security Studies Seminar

In September, IAP Marines from Germany, Latvia, Norway, and the National Capital Region traveled to Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany to attend the 15th annual Eurasian Security Studies Seminar (ES3) hosted by the US Army and the George C. Marshall European Center for Security Studies. The seminar is currently directed by US Army LTC Vincent Mucker, an Army FAO (48E) with extensive experience in Security Cooperation throughout Europe, and a strong proponent for FAO development and mentorship. This year, the three-week region-specific orientation seminar was held from 12-30 September and saw the largest Marine contingent (5) in the history of the course. US Marine Corps, Navy, and Air Force Officers, as well as George C. Marshall Center fellows, participated in the seminar encouraging the joint nature of security cooperation and Foreign Area Officer networking in Europe. As the Marine Corps grows its FAO presence in Europe and professionalizes its force, ES3 will continue to be a vital resource for the orientation of Europe/Eurasia-focused Officers and Staff Noncommissioned Officers.

The three-week seminar provided a high-paced, yet balanced mix of classroom lectures and panels, field studies, headquarters visits, networking socials, and professional development and tradecraft discussions. In week one, FAOs received in-person briefings from experts and high-ranking officials from across the spectrum of European Security issues including the newly appointed Senior

Defense Official/Defense Attaché (SDO) to Ukraine, Brigadier General Garrick Harmon, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Force Readiness, Ms. Kimberly Jackson, the Marshall Center Dean for the College of International and Security Studies, Dr. Andrew Michta, the Director of Strategic Security Studies, Colonel Matt Neumeyer, Arctic Security expert and PhD Candidate, Commander Rachael Gosnell, and many others.

In week two, participants conducted site visits to European Command in Stuttgart, Germany, US Army European Command in Wiesbaden, Germany, the Luxembourg American Cemetery in Luxembourg, the Bastogne Museum and Easy Company Foxholes in Bastogne, Belgium, and NATO Headquarters in Brussels, Belgium. The visits allowed FAOs to meet with desk officers, regional department heads, Security Cooperation Officers (SCOs), Senior Defense Officials/Defense Attachés (SDO/DATTs), NATO policy makers, and commanders. FAOs were also given the opportunity to participate in socials to build comradery and relationships with the officials they may be working with in their future FAO assignments. Although the week was fast-paced and required significant travel, learning objectives were focused on ensuring FAOs have the resources, tools, and relationships required to be successful.

Week 3 focused on FAO professional development and tradecraft with ES3 hosting a series of panels and socials to provide participants an opportunity to engage with senior FAOs across the joint force and to learn more about the roles, responsibilities, and

functions of FAOs as attachés, security assistance officers, as well as many other low-density FAO positions across the department of defense. In week 3, FAOs heard from Ambassador Eric Nelson who served as the United States Ambassador to Bosnia and Herzegovina from 2019 to 2022, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Russia, Ukraine, and Eurasia, Ms. Laura Cooper, and Major General Lasica, Director of Plans, Policy, Strategy, and Capabilities, J-5/8, United States European Command, Stuttgart, Germany. IAP Marines also had the opportunity to meet with Lieutenant Colonel Christopher Dellow, IAP Program Manager from HQ USMC.

Program Updates

- LREC Sustainment Program (LSP): FY23 LSP is opened with some restrictions due to availability of funds. FAOs and FASs are encouraged to submit your requests for processing and approval. Please review the LSP Request Procedures on the IAP website prior to submitting your request. You must have a FAO or FAS AMOS and a current DLPT to request funds for language sustainment. Priority is to your principal assigned language. You must show a proficiency (3/3) in your principal language or an immediate validated requirement if you wish to be considered for an additional same-region 2nd or 3rd language. Additionally, priority for funding will go to FAOs below 2/2 and FASs below 1/1 preparing for FAO/FAS assignment and DLPT. All TAD LSP requests must be LSP requirements, command-endorsed. requests instructions, and templates can be found HERE.
- FAO/RAO/FAS/PEP's In-Action Photos and Articles: IAP & DLNSEO are looking for high-definition photos capturing FAO/RAO/FAS/PEPs in action and articles highlighting your contributions to the service and the joint force.
