Message from the Program Manager

Happy New Year Ladies and Gentlemen! In this edition of the IAP community update I wanted to use my space to discuss the process to fill FAO and RAO coded billets. As this is slating season at MMOA, we have gotten quite a few requests for utilization from 2nd tour and Experience Track FAOs and RAOs. I sense your frustration in not being able to see what billets are available and thought maybe pulling back the curtain would help everyone understand the process.

First, we look to MMOA to determine what billets need to be filled for the upcoming PCS season. Since promotion boards, school boards, and special program selection boards (e.g., Attaché) are not announced until Nov/ Dec we really don't have a clear picture of who is a mover and what billets will be open until mid-December. In an effort to get the process started early, in November we send out a questionnaire asking for general desires (CONUS, OCONUS, NCR, etc...) to all Marines who owe a payback from the Study Track program. As we coordinate with the Graduate Education Monitor and PMOS Monitors, names are added to and deleted from the list when board and panel results are released into December. This process takes time and we don't have a solid idea of where the entire Study Track group is going until late December. Once we have a solid lock on all the billets that have not been filled by those who owe the Marine Corps a payback tour, we publish the list of remaining billets on the PLU-8 website HERE. Although these billets are filled directly by the PMOS monitors, we have a large interest in making sure that FAO/RAO billets are filled adequately. While the monitors can issue orders without us knowing, it helps if you also let us know that you are interested in a billet so that we can advocate for you and the program. The process takes time and our only advocate within MMOA also manages all of the other Graduate Education Programs in the Marine Corps. While we are hoping that some of the concepts discussed in the Commandant's Talent Management Strategy will provide more transparency to the process, it is important to remember that the tools required to affect these changes will take time to incorporate. Additionally, while a new "Market Place" for billets will give Marines increased input into the orders slating process, individual desire will always need to be balanced with the needs of the Service. Lastly, I want to reassure the community that the International Affairs Program Marines we are creating today are truly some of the most ambitious and forward-thinking Marines we have ever seen. I encourage all the "Old IAP" Marines to find the younger generation of IAP Marines in their commands and share your insights and experiences.

United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission - South Korea


Major Joseph F. Phippen is a North-East Asia FAO currently serving at the United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission in South Korea.



Maj Phippen and UNC Liaison officers from 16 different nations observe the ROK Marine Corps Task Force setup to counter Chinese piracy in the Han River Estuary located between North and South Korea.



Major Phippen escorts counterparts from the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) and Ministry of National Defense Agency for KIA (Killed in Action) Recovery and Identification (MAKRI) into the Korean DMZ near Hill 111. Still mined and under watch of North Korean guard posts, the site is the last known location of 1stLt Carl Lindquist, a Platoon Commander from 1st Battalion 3rd Marines. Officially declared missing in action just two days before the end of the Korean War, his remains may still be there.

FAS Program Corner

SSGT ISAAC PELENDO - AFRICA FAS MARINE CORPS FORCES EUROPE AND AFRICA

In July 2021, SSgt Pelendo led a Women, Peace, and Security (WPS) discussion panel in Monrovia, Liberia. The purpose of this panel was to initiate discussion on potential opportunities for new female recruits in the Armed Forces of Liberia (AFL). Marine Corps Forces Europe and Africa (MARFOREUR/AF) and Naval Forces Africa (NAVAF) collaborated together in order to assist the AFL in developing a recruiting program that will support their mandated Presidential decree to have 20% women in their ranks. The panel discussion introduced and examined the purpose and means of increasing new AFL female recruitment and integration among stakeholders. WPS is an integral component in the effort to enhance African partner capability, enabling U.S. security cooperation to better leverage the contributions of both men and women.

During the discussion panel, SSgt Pelendo led discussions in various topics to include challenges, motivation, gender role and inclusion in the military, recruitment and retention. Various ranks amongst the participants were present. From junior enlisted, to senior enlisted and officer. This event informed the State Department, USAID, and AFRICOM's WPS branch on the current situation, way forward, and opportunities to increase the amount of women. As an Africa Foreign Area SNCO, knowing the country's history, culture, and language were instrumental and crucial to the success of the panel.

- LREC Sustainment Program (LSP): FY22 LSP is opened with some restrictions due to Continuous Resolution and Marine Corps transition of financial systems. FAOs and FASs are encouraged to submit your requests for processing and approval. Please review the LSP Request Procedures on the IAP website prior to submitting your request. You must have a FAO or FAS AMOS and a current DLPT to request funds for language sustainment. Priority is to your principal assigned language. You must show a proficiency (3/3) in your principal language or an immediate validated requirement if you wish to be considered for an additional same-region 2nd or 3rd language. Additionally, priority for funding will go to FAOs below 2/2 and FASs below 1/1 preparing for FAO/FAS assignment and DLPT. All TAD LSP requests must be command-endorsed and meet all COVID-19 travel restriction requirements. LSP requests requirements, instructions, and templates can be found here.
