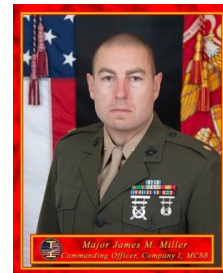




## COMPANY I Marine Cryptologic Support Battalion Command Philosophy
