After two unsuccessful attempts had been made to reach a patrol which had been fired upon suddenly by the enemy, wounding one of the members and cutting off the remainder from the company, Sergeant Jennings volunteered to make his way through the intense hostile fire, lead the patrol back to his company and permit the delivery of mortar and artillery fire on the Japanese. Successfully accomplishing his mission, he led the patrol back without casualty and made it possible for the wounded man to be evacuated. His courage, ini-tiative and zealous devotion to duty throughout were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.





While leading his company along a treacherous cliff, Captain Juett bravely worked his way down the side in the face of hostile mortar and machinegun fire and successfully completed a reconnaissance of the area. Returning to his unit for tank assistance, he personally led the vehicles through the barrage and brought them into effective firing position, thereby contributing directly to the reduction of the enemy fire which allowed his company to continue their advance. His courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

CITATION:

"For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity as Squad Leader in a combat patrol serving with the First Battalion, Twentieth Marines, Fourth Marine Division, Juring operations at Saipan, Marianas Group, on 20 July 1944. Skillfully deploying his men upon making contact with a strong enemy force, Sergeant Juhnke immediately launched a vigorous attack against powerful hostile positions in the face of withering enemy fire. Observing a member of his squad lying helpless in a dangerously exposed position, he unhesitatingly braved the continuous barrages from powerful Japanese guns in an attempt to rescue his comrade but was fatally struck down while carrying out his voluntary mission. His cool courage and self-sacrificing efforts in behalf of another upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country."
